farmers


14 % of principal operators are women

Shifts in Principal Farm Operators 2007-2012

- Fewer female operators
- More minority operators
- Higher average age of farm operators
- Fewer beginning operators
- Fewer small farms




Women farmers face challenges

- struggle to legitimize position as farmers
- lack training/skills to operate farms
- approach problems in different ways than men farmers
- lack adequate capital and land
- want information



Women Farmers Successes

- 1) shaping new environmentally sound food and farming systems;
- 2) creating gender equality on farms;
- 3) asserting the identity of farmer;
- 4) pursuing innovative ways to access land, labor and capital;
- 5) navigating agricultural organizations reluctant to meet their needs, and
- 6) forming new networking organizations for women farmers.

USDA Programs for women farmers


- FSA programs target new and beginning women farmers
